SMOKE-FREE CSU

Chancellor White plans to implement a systemwide cigarette ban

he CSU Academic Senate's resolution to ban tobacco products on all CSU campuses is one step closer to being implemented as an executive order.

At Wednesday's meeting, the senate's chair, Dr. Diana Guerin, thanked Chancellor Timothy White for responding to the senate's plan to make the CSU smoke-free.

"He wants to plan the process to ban all tobacco products in the CSU and cessation programs," Guerin said. "We would be pleased to participate in this (and) provided solutions electronically to the board."

Currently the only CSU campus with a tobacco policy is San Francisco State University, which bans tobacco use outside of designated smoking areas. Cal State Fullerton is the first CSU campus that will become 100 percent smoke-free as of August 2013.

Two CSUN student representatives of the Campuses Organized and United for Good Health (COUGH) expressed their support for such a policy during a 30-minute public forum segment.

"Current smokers can successfully quit with a 100 percent campus tobacco free policy," said CSUN COUGH President Charleen Mikail. "We must ensure that each of the campuses can provide cessation services to students, faculty and staff."

CSUN COUGH Vice President, Marleni DePhilippis, urged CSUN

President Dianne Harrison to progress a smoke-free policy at the Northridge campus.

"This policy is a long victory and show the cost efforts around the state haven't been in vain and we encourage you to move this policy forward," DePhilippis said. "We have confidence that with your continued support we will be successful in assisting our campus transition in becoming 100 percent tobacco free."

White did not mention the smokefree policy in his report, but expressed his overall support for the CSU system as he completes a tour of the 23 CSU campuses.

'You can compare the California University to a quilt of many fabrics, stronger as a whole than the sum-

mation of the parts," White said. "I am learning about the unique fabrics during the visits and find better ways to work together and stronger as one."

Student representatives from CSU Long Beach Associated Students Inc. (ASI) also spoke during the public forum to oppose Gov. Jerry Brown's unit cap funding policy in his education budget for 2013-14. His policy would cap financial aid for all CSU students at a maximum of 150 course units by 2015.

ASI Sen. Agatha Gucyski representing the CSULB College of Business Administration explained that the unit cap will hurt students majoring in STEM majors—science, technology, engineering and mathematics—who are required to complete a base of 150 units for an undergraduate degree.

"As the mission of the CSU is to provide high quality and accessible education we don't want to punish our students," Gucyski said. "Students who will be affected the most are STEM majors and others as well. Accounting majors need 150 units in order to get a CPA, do we want to punish students getting that degree in order to have a promising future?"

John Haberstroh handed the resolution, sealed in an envelope, to a board member.

The board also gave recognition to Rebecca Mieliwocki, who was awarded as the 2012 National Teacher of the Year by the Council of Chief State School Officers.

Mieliwocki, who graduated

from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo with her bachelors degree and completed her credentials at CSUN, teaches seventh grade English at Luther Burbank Middle School, but has of late been traveling the country and internationally on an education tour. She described


how important the CSU was

for her training and practice as a teacher.

"I am a proud product of California schools from preschool to my last class at Cal State Northridge," said Mieliwocki. "I was taught by the best and given so much responsibility and opportunity and expectations through the roof. 

Athletic trainers celebrate career all month

Kiniseology department helps students learn on the job skills through clinical education rotations and classes

n California, there is currently a licensure bill (AB 864) that would define the scope of athletic training and keep non-certified individuals from identifying themselves as athletic trainers.

Shane Stecyk, associate professor and director of CSUN's athletic training education program, said if the bill is signed into law, it could help students.

"This is a problem at some high schools in California because these non-certified individuals are not able to provide the level of care that an athletic trainer can," Stecyk said. "And with concussions being a significant problem especially at the high school level, it is vitally important that the public understands who certified athletic trainers are."

March marks National Athletic Training month for the training program and is promoted by the National Athletic Training Association to help people better understand the career.

The education program will sell t-shirts during the month and put up posters around Redwood Hall, which is the kinesiology building.

"It is important because the more we can educate the public, the more we can contribute to health care in general," Stecyk said. "Although there is overlap of knowledge and skills between various allied health professions (athletic training, physical therapy, nursing), each profession is different and each profession provides healthcare to the public."

Stecyk also added that athletic trainers have been recognized as allied health professionals by the American Medical Association since 1991.

The training program is involved in two off-campus events every March. These events are the St. Francis Sports Medicine Competition and the National Honors Society of Sports Medicine.

The St. Francis Sports Medicine Competition is hosted by St. Francis High School and brings students from across the U.S. to test their knowledge in sports medicine and athletic training. At last year's event nearly 550 students attended, according to Stecyk.

The National Honors Society of Sports Medicine, which was founded in 2007 by certified athletic trainers Eli Hallak and Cindy Kramer, is an organization with over 35 chapters across the United States.

Stecyk said an Honors Society event last year was held at Staples Center in conjunction with the Los Angeles Clippers, with about 1,200 students in attendance.

"I think national training month will raise awareness about athletic trainers and help people learn about what athletic trainers actually do,"

said Miguel Quintero, part-time CSUN faculty lecturer and certified athletic trainer.

CSUN has been in existence since 1974 and is presently accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Athletic Training Education (CAATE) until the 2016-2017 academic year.

The program teaches athletic train-

ing majors classroom and clinical education components for five semesters and requires one summer session.

Students admitted to the program are expected to be full-time students throughout the course and must complete 15-25 hours per week for their clinical education rotations.

This career field includes professions such as athletic training, medi-

cine, nursing, biomechanics, sports psychology, exercise physiology, pharmacy and nutrition, according to the program's home page.

Once students complete the program they are eligible to take the national certification examination for entry level athletic trainers, which is directed by the Board of Certification, Inc.

EVERYONE'S A CRITIC

There's nothing magical about 'Wonderstone'

rowing up I wasn't a fan of magic. I never understood the appeal of a guy waving a wand around, or pulling a rabbit out of a hat. The wonder never took ahold of me. So going into "The Incredible Burt Wonderstone," I was hoping to get a few laughs and maybe even a glimpse into something I had shied away from as a kid.

Was I asking too much? Yep. What I ended up getting was a movie so lost in its own bewildered sense of magic you can't help but feel cheated by its sloppy prestige.

Steve Carell plays the title role, a cynical magician who has lost his

way. He dumps his best friend and partner, Anton Marvelton, (Steve Buscemi) and is fired by his boss, Doug Munny, (James Gandolfini). Burt must then regain his love of magic, get his friend back, get the girl and... well, you know the rest.

The story (team behind 'Horrible Bosses') is a mess, and the direction by Don Scardino (30 Rock) felt uninspired. Some of the gags had potential, mainly Jim Carrey's as an over-the-top magician stealing Burt's thunder. However, the comedic effect is lost on the films infuriating habit of pulling its punches.

It's obvious who the movie takes shots at (Criss Angel, David Blaine, Sigfried and Roy), but it seems as if they didn't want to hurt anyone's feelings. As an audience member this was frustrating, especially with characters this blatantly uneven. Carell looks bored, Carrey's shtick is beaten like a dead horse (an actual

scene in the movie; kind of) and Olivia Wilde chooses vet another flat role. Buscemi, Gandolfini and the reliable Alan Arkin give it a shot, but none of them really seem to care. Rightfully so, their talents are wasted on a one-note mess.

That aside, the biggest issue with the film, aside from not being funny, lies with Wonderstone himself. Carell tries, but the character is too unlikeable to empathize with. When Wilde's character, Jane, tries to right Burt's path, he just gets worse. Only when Burt meets his idol, Rance Holloway (Arkin) does he start to slightly change, but even then he is played more like a buffoon and less like a comeback kid. The outrageous ending only makes matters worse by opting for a mean-spirited and phony final act. Considering the talent on and off the screen, it's probably best for everyone to move on and forget this cheap trick.


Northridge resident Adam Artizada summed up his experience at a Saturday night Barclays jazz performance.


"I came here for the musicians and it's great," he said. "The coffee's great, the music's great. It's definitely better than Starbucks."

Looking back at 'Girls'

eason two of the critically acclaimed HBO series "Girls" saw the series go in a direction that fans feared after the stellar first season.

While working on season two, creator Lena Dunham was receiving a ton of awards and being touted as the voice of a generation by many in the media. Unfortunately, the success appears to have went to her head as season two became entirely too self-involved.

The great dialogue and interactions of season one were replaced by monologues by Dunham's character Hannah. Some of the monologues are great, like the one at the end of "Bad Friend" where Hannah points out how the formerly composed Marnie (Allison Williams) is falling apart. But too many monologues, like the "I want to feel everything!" speech in "One Man's Trash," are plagued by episodes that are too self-serving

Dunham uses Hannah to show how stressful "making it" is, but the storyline lacks relativeness and falls flat.

The entire season isn't a total loss. Ironically, the stars of Girls season two are actually the men. Hannah's gay ex-boyfriend Elijah (Andrew Rannells) steals the first

couple episodes and his interactions with Hannah are some of the shows most intriguing scenes. In "Bad Friend," the two go on a bender and have an iconic dance scene to Icono Pop's "I Love It." The scene propelled the song to the Billboard Hot 100 list, proving that Dunham still has some pop culture relevancy.

One particular episode that the men carry is fittingly titled "Boys." There's a brilliant scene shared by Shoshanna's (Zosia Mamet) cynical boyfriend Ray (Alex Karpovsky) and Hannah's neurotic ex-bovfriend Adam (Adam Driver), while the two are returning a stolen dog to Staten Island.

Adam has a great speech about how Hannah is a carnival prize that you don't even want, but try so hard to get anyways. Then, he says, after you win it, you're stuck walking around the carnival with a big, stupid stuffed animal.

As the season went on and Adam became a more prominent character, the episodes got better. The season ended with its strongest two episodes, one of which had a controversial scene that got a lot of press.

The scene in "On All Four," shows Adam's dark side when he forces his girlfriend Natalia to do sexual things she's not too into. The scene got a lot of negative press about how it was over-the-top and made people feel uncomfortable, but those same critics were calling it rough sex and not rape, which is what it was.

"Girls" may have regressed in its second season, but Dunham's commentary about femininity and rape awareness on TV is important. The fact that the show ended on a high note inspires hope for season three.

USU proposes new technology lounge

Board of Directors unsure of completion date and ask for student feedback to build location

he USU Board of Directors is currently working on creating a technology lounge on campus.

Although originally projected to open by the end of 2013, the board has now decided to complete only a proposed design, based on their meeting held last month.

"A completion date is still to be determined and will be based on what students want in this space, the budget and how quickly we can make it happen," said Shannon Krajewski, USU associate director for marketing and programs.

According to Kevin Lizarraga, USU marketing manager, the Oviatt Library is undergoing renovations as well and will be installing new furniture and technology.

The renovations will be found throughout the first floor of the library including both wings and the core. Renovations will include new technologies

for librarians and ergonomic and flexible furniture for students.

The renovations in the library are proposed to start in Fall 2013.

Based on observation from this addition, the USU will assess how students use these items in the library and incorporate whether additional similar items are needed, or if something completely different should be created in the technology lounge.

"Once we know the needs, then a budget can be developed," Lizarraga said, referring to the planning of the lounge.

Student feedback is equally important in planning the technology lounge. Determinations of what students want and need are thoroughly incorporated into the board's decisions in building and furnishing this new space.

"As a young person, the idea of a technology lounge sounds great. However, I believe more funding should be put into areas such as enabling students to take more classes and supporting professors to teach those classes," said Amanda Sutton, 25, senior health administration.

"The idea of a lounge with big screen televisions, computers and possibly video games is another way to keep students indoors and inactive," said Matthew Rodriguez, 23, iunior environmental and occupational health major.

Details as to what will be included regarding furniture, equipment and amenities has not yet been disclosed, but according to Krawjeski, because there is already a television lounge in the Sol Center, the technology lounge might focus more on supporting group and individual studying.

"It is important to the University Student Union and its board of directors that all decisions we make, especially those with fiscal implications, are informed by student input and assessment data," Krajewski said.

The location for the technology lounge, decided at the USU Board of Directors meeting in June 2012, will be in the former computer lab located on the second floor of the Sol Center building.

Funding for this space will come from existing student fees paid each semester at the USU. An

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The myth of gender equality

The fight needs to continue as young girls and women globally are still being devalued because of their gender

on't fool yourself. It's still a man's world. Yes, some of you might argue that the issue is tiring, boring and repetitive. But it must be repeated until the words are heard and the goal is achieved. And yes, we have come a long way and that certainly needs to be acknowledged. However, more work needs to be done before we can tell ourselves that we live in a supposedly gender-blind society. It is only when every mother, daughter, sister and grandmother worldwide can breathe and walk safely, that we can proudly and firmly shout gender equality.


To live free from violence and inhumane treatment is one of the most fundamental human rights that should be given to everyone regardless of gender. Yet, it is estimated that one in every three women worldwide experience violence and in some countries, almost 70 percent of women have their basic human rights violated. These manifestations of violence range from rape to domestic abuse, honor-killing and acid burnings. But perhaps one of the merciless practices that continues to plague young girls and women in the world is female genital cutting or FGM.

According to the 2013 report by the World Health Organization, "about 140 million girls and women worldwide are currently living with the consequence of FGM." Each day, some 8,000 girls face the risk of getting mutilated.

For those who are unaware of FGM, it is a procedure that intentionally alters or causes injury to the female genital organs by partial or total removal of the external female genitalia. It is a grotesque and inhumane practice that is carried out on young women between the periods of infancy and the age of 15. Not only does it cause unbearable, immediate pain and shock, but life-long health problems; both physical and psychological.

More than

Some people claim that Islam is to blame for this practice, but this is far from the truth. It's imperative to remember that religion is never the cause for man-made problems. Rather, the practice of FGM, which is not unknown to the West as they performed clitoridectomies into the 1940s, is the consequence of our patriarchal global society that has devalued women for as

long as the existence of mankind. A mindset that is slowly evolving, but still remains very much alive, especially when it comes to man-made deprivation and barriers that have become increasingly attached to gendered roles over time.

According to the Girls and Women's Education Initiative an organization that attempts to meet the needs of the educationally disadvantaged, "one in three women and girls in the developing world live on less than \$2 a day." The same INFORMATION COURTESY OF WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION amount of money we usually spend on a bottle of water is the same amount other people have to stretch in order to feed themselves and their family, buy clothes, pay rent while trying to send one's children to school; a strenuous choice that often has negative effects on young women who are often excluded

from gaining an education. According the 2012 report 'Because I am a Girl,' only 74 percent of young women between the age of 11 and 15 are in school globally, compared to 83 percent of boys. As indicated by the report, these numbers do not share the reality of poorer and rural girls or girls in conflict-affected regions. Consequently, the average number would drop even further if these lives were to be included.

It's essential to remember that once young women are excluded from school, choices become few and far between, leaving marriage as the most practical path one can take to survive poverty. It is estimated that more than 10,000 girls a $^{\textit{INFORMATION COURTESY OF WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION}$

day will eventually get married before they turn 15 and most of them give birth before they turn too many young lives to maternal mortality.

According to the 2012 report by the World Health Organization, every day, more than 800 women die from preventable causes related to pregnancy and childbirth. Moreover, 99 percent of all maternal deaths occur in developing countries.

When examining the world and the listless issues that women face, particularly in developing countries, one can quickly make the assertion that industrialized countries like the U.S. have come a long way and the work of feminism has been very fruitful in achieving gender equality. But this is a fallacious proclamation that erases everyday reality of women.

The 'The National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey,' by Centers for Diseases and Control Prevention show more than one million women are raped a year and about one in four women have experienced severe physical violence. These extremely sobering numbers are attached to many faces that could be your sister, friend, daughter, mother or grandmother. Consequently, the fight against sexual violence should be everyone's fight; both men and women- young and old. Furthermore, it's imperative to remember that violence against women is not the only issue that needs to be accentuated; firm barriers that stand against opportunities in a supposedly democratic, un-patri-

need to be broken down. According to the 2012 report by the United State Census Bureau, "the poverty rate for males decreased between 2010 and 2011 from 14 percent to 13.6 percent." However, the poverty rate for females remained 16.3 percent, a discrepancy that cannot be explained by any educational gap.

archal progressive country

The 2013 report 'Still Behind,' by The Women's Legal Defense and Education Fund, showed that young women now surpass young men in educational attainment. In 2012, more than 30 percent of women age 21 to 30 had a bachelor's degree compared to 23 percent of men in the same age group. However,

this report showed that young men still have superior levels of economic well 18. Unfortunately, the world is already losing being where the median income for women was about \$14,000 compared to \$20,000

> Perhaps more significantly, when comparing the U.S. with other industrialized countries, one cannot overstate enough how much the country is lagging behind in

terms of gender equality, especially when it comes to maternity leave and political empowerment.

According to a 2013 report by 'Raising the Global Floor,' an organization that measures governmental performance, wage replacement of paid leave for mothers in the Scandinavian countries, Russia and China is between 75 percent to 100 percent. In the U.S., there is no such concept or policy as wage replacement. In fact, the only four countries that do not have wage replacement or duration of paid leave for mothers globally are Papau New Guinea, Sierra Leone, Liberia and the U.S.

Although we tend to categorize childbearing as a private issue, it ought to be treated as a public issue because the well-being of mothers and their children affects the well-being of the nation as a whole. However, most societies have been slow to implement safeguards that could drastically improve the lives of women; a reality that can be partly explained through the exclusion of women in the political realm where decisions are often made for a woman and not by her.

According to the 2013 report 'Women in National Parliaments,' Rwanda is the only country in the world that has more than 50 percent of women in its legislature. The U.S. is ranked 77 out of the 139 countries listed with 17 percent of women in its legislature. Of the 435 members in the house, 80 are women and of the 100 senators, 20 are women.

For decades, blood has been spilled and tears shared in order to achieve gender equality. We have fought for the right of girls and women to be seen and heard as human beings; to be respected for their individual work, dedication, and integrity. More importantly, to make sure that they are able to walk safely on this earth without fearing that their gender might be the cause for an early, unjustifiable and inhumane death. Women in this world are not asking for much. All they want, and most definitely deserve, is to be treated and respected as human beings; a cost-free demand that should be in everyone's interest to provide.

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
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Chicago's streak product of lockout

was bound to happen. The Chicago Blackhawks ended their season starting

points streak at 24 consecutive games in a blowout loss to Colorado on March 8. Fans and admirers were on

the edge of their seat to see if Chicago could keep their record going, but even the hottest of teams have their bad days and make careless

When this season started on Jan. 19 after the lockout ended, the Blackhawks faced the Stanley Cup Champion Los Angeles Kings and won 5-2, beginning the streak.

If the lockout hadn't happened earlier this year, would they have even come as far as the remarkable number they accomplished?

Judging by their previous records, the answer is no. If you look back to the start of last season season, they lost their first game, and in the first month they earned a 7-4 record. The previous two seasons before this saw them

go 7-6 and 8-5, playing a normal, full schedule against both conferences.

The Blackhawks wouldn't have this record if the lockout hadn't happened because they are not playing against tougher Eastern Conference teams. The lockout impeded the season so much that games had to be scheduled within each team's conference.

Feasting on a plethora of weaker teams, much like the Miami Heat of the NBA are doing with their current streak, the Blackhawks used this as a launching pad to the best season start in league history.

Eastern Conference teams are notoriously harder to beat, such as the NY Rangers, Philadelphia Flyers, Boston Bruins and Pittsburgh Penguins, who consistently bring their best game and make the playoffs. Keeping a 24-game points streak going against lineups like those mentioned would have been possible, but extremely difficult.

If losing their first game against Colorado wasn't devastating enough, they lost the following game to the Edmonton Oilers 6-5, their first losing streak of the season. They have already started out on a new streak, win-

assified Ads

ning three games in a row by blowing out their opponents, including an 8-1 trouncing of the Dallas Stars on March 16.

Sure, their amazing record wouldn't be set if it wasn't for the lockout, but regardless, they set a record that has only been outdone by the Philadelphia Flyers in 1979-1980, with a record of 35 consecutive games won in regulation.

Line consistency was a key aspect of their success. Players mention that line consistency is a big part in playing the game and once you get one goal through the net adrenaline kicks in, and that's definitely something we saw with Chicago's success.

Without some luck that saw them come back in multiple games with minutes left or heading to overtime or shootouts, the Blackhawks wouldn't be in this conversation. Throughout the 27 games, the Blackhawks went past regulation 10 times, including six shootouts.

The Blackhawks still succeeded in a tremendous historical, record-high moment that will be talked about in the NHL for a long time to come, but would have never happened for them any other year.

They are one team that can coast through their region, ranking in the top 50 in most offensive categories. The experts keep talking about how the Oregon Ducks are jaded and out to prove they are better than the 12 seed they were given. An opening round matchup against a proven Oklahoma State team doesn't make their mission any easier. Don't expect Oregon to make it through the first round. They have never looked cohesive as a team, suffering losses at the hands of lesser teams throughout the season, but especially as of late. Who to watch for:

Top-seeded Gonzaga won't fall anytime soon. Armed with the NCAA's 12th best offense (77.6 points per game) on over 50 percent shooting (good for third best in the nation), look for the Bulldogs to roll over the competition in the first few rounds. The power forward/ center combination of Kelly Olynyk and Elias Harris has proven to be too much for teams to handle as the duo combines for around 30 points and 15 rebounds per night.

Though they will have a tough road ahead of them -- one that most likely has them going through a powerhouse trio of Pittsburgh, Kansas State and Ohio State barring any upsets -- Gonzaga has only lost twice this season. Sure, they may not have faced the stiffest competition around, but all of their wins were what they should have been: blowout victories. This team is ready to face bigger, better teams and show they can persevere.

Their guard play may be weak, but Gonzaga's bigs

oring for a Duke upset for the second straight year after 2012's Lehigh fiasco, but don't expect that facing the Albany Great Danes. I honestly don't really see an upset here in the first round, unless you consider ninth seeded Missouri beating eighth seeded Colorado, which we don't.

Who to watch for:

Kansas is one of the favorites to reach the Final Four this year, unfortunately the selection committee stuck them with a third round game against UNC if both should advance in the second round. UNC may not be the team of previous years, but they do have a hot shooter in P.J. Hairston, who scorched

Miami for 28 points on Sunday.

Do not expect UNC to make it any further than that round, but you can expect Georgetown's grind-it-out low-scoring defense to make it through to the Sweet 16. Shutting down teams with their overbearing pressure, it reminds me of VCU's defense with media darling Shaka Smart. A matchup

between Kansas and Georgetown can be expected in this region, but both have tough roads to get there with some tight games in between.

Upsets:

Akron versus VCU seems to be one that is going to come down to who can conquer the other persons' defense faster. Both coaches were assistants together on the Akron staff, and Smart was once the assistant of the current Akron head coach. They know each other's playing styles and can expect to use that against each other, but as St. Louis University showed last weekend, VCU is a team that can be figured out. The Zips are an all-around balanced team with VCU being strong in its defense, and while they can score, their rankings in the NCAA are not eye-popping.

Minnesota is another possible upset bid against an injured UCLA lineup. Missing Jordan Adams had an effect in the PAC-12 Championships, and will in the NCAA's; a bad injury at the wrong time. The Golden Gophers are on a three game losing streak but hope to turn that around with lockdown defense against a high-scoring Bruin offense.
