

# To stream or not to stream

#### The fan divide between digital and physical music

In 2021, Lorde decided there would be no physical album for the release of "Solar Power" in 2021 "to honor the natural world, a first-of-its-kind disc-less format."

This is one of the first times I realized that while it's cool to show love to your favorite artist by purchasing their albums and vinyls, it's also cool to just stream their music and engage with it on social media. We are already on our phones everyday – why do we need more CD's and vinyls sitting on the planet?

As humans, we are bound to hyperfixate on a character in the media or an artist on the radio. When this happens, because of the veil on consumerism hanging over us at all times, we want to buy into our fixations. For some, that's following them on social media and streaming their music. For others, it goes beyond that. They have to buy everything that the artist puts out, from beauty products to several releases of the same album. Showing admiration and support monetarily is great, but it does get to a point where the level at which you are consuming an artist's merchandise is excessive.

For every bad thing the internet has done to our society, the best thing, in my opinion, is the convenience factor. With a smart device, you literally have the world at your fingertips. For a music lover like myself, being able to play music whenever I want to, from multiple platforms, is the best part of the digital era.





In a world where buying digital media doesn't guarantee ownership, buying physical media is both imperative and a protest. Streaming platforms like Apple Music and Spotify are currently the most popular form of consuming music – they're also the most practical. However, even with a paid subscription, the platforms are able to remove songs and artists from their catalog. This not only hurts the artists, but does a disservice to the consumers who pay for the platform. With physical media like CDs and vinyls, fans can physically own the music. They don't need a monthly subscription for ad-free streaming,

Streaming platforms are also not the best way to support artists. These platforms only pay approximately \$0.004-\$0.008 per stream. This is not enough of a living for the artists that are not already top earning musicians. For smaller artists, buying their merchandise pays more than if their music is streamed.

downloading or offline listening.

Many artists themselves have protested streaming platforms, such as Among Authors, who were penalized by TuneCore when Spotify incorrectly flagged their catalog for "illegal bot streams." Among Authors have now removed all of their music from streaming platforms and are encouraging their fans to buy their first vinyl at a pay-what-you-can price.

It is more practical to keep your music consumption to your digital devices. However, definite ownership over the media one consumes secures their ability to continue consuming it. Protesting corrupt streaming platforms ensures fair treatment for everyone's favorite artists.

Due to this, the skaters have confirmed that they have been reported and involved with campus police numerous times. Despite consistently being told to leave, they continue to return as if they were never reported or told to leave in the first place.

The group understands how they can be perceived, but skateboarding is their form of expression. They remain focused on their academic goals while also gathering around Manzantia Hall to practice kickflips and enjoy their years at college with friends.

"We all have a common goal of progress and friendships have evolved from that," Bryant said. "I think it's really nice because some of the people here, I feel like they wouldn't have flourished as much as they have in school without this place. I know I'm one of those people. Although many gamers enjoy the usual cozy simulators such as Stardew Valley and Animal Crossing, independent game developers have created unique, relaxing games that deserve recognition as well. I've curated a short list of comfy games that I enjoy playing in the fall, all under \$20. Whether you enjoy simulation games or prefer slow story-driven adventures, reeling in the season with a charming indie game is a fun way to get into the fall spirit.



#### Galaxy Burger – \$11.99

Galaxy Burger is a cooking simulation game where players serve burgers to aliens and mecha cats. Designed to be stress-free, time limits are eliminated, encouraging a relaxing gaming session. It has a nostalgic feel that reminds me of the classic Papa's Games series.



#### Littlewood - \$14.99

# Welcome back, 1995.

The youth of the 1990s propelled a resurgence in the cultural phenomena of the eras prior. From bell-bottom pants to the 1998 TV show "That '70s Show" – the 1990s were influenced by the fashion, culture and even the political upheaval of the 1970s.

Theories claim that cultural trends work in 20 to 30-year cycles. As 90s trends make their way back around, this theory rings true. So, are the '20s the new '90s?

In January of this year, the surviving members of Nirvana, one of the most influential bands of the '90s, reunited in Los Angeles at FireAid. Dave Grohl, Krist Novoselic and Pat Smear performed four songs, closing out the performance with 1993's "All Apologies," which had been performed only one other time since Nirvana's final concert on March 1, 1994.

Many of music's biggest festivals have welcomed '90s sensations back to their stages. For three consecutive years, '90s legends rocked the desert at Coachella Music and Arts Festival. The year 2023 welcomed Blink-182, who reunited with their former guitarist Tom DeLonge in the year prior, 2024 hosted No Doubt for their first performance in 9 years and in 2025, Green Day also rocked the main stage as a headliner. Less than three months after this, Oasis made their musical comeback for the first time in 16 years.

One of the most influential developments of the '90s was technology. Between at-home internet, mobile phones and MP3 players, the technology of the '90s was one of the biggest changes in pop culture to date.

The phones we have today combine computers, MP3 players, game consoles and digital cameras into one shiny box, but younger generations are reverting to "single-purpose devices."

Recently, pocket technology of the '90s has come back into the spotlight. Digital cameras, Wi-Fi-compatible Sony Walkmans and turning smartphones into "dumbphones" are hallmarks of this technological regression.

Studies have shown that more people are using their smartphones politically. A 2010 Pew Research Poll showed that more than a quarter of cell phone users researched and participated in the 2010 midterm election using their phones. Now, that number is likely much higher.

In June, protestors flooded the streets of Los Angeles to denounce the Trump administration's push for mass deportation through ICE raids. Five years prior, the same streets held protestors denouncing police brutality following George Floyd's death in Minneapolis.

Political demonstrations and protests targeting the rights of undocumented immigrants and police brutality are no stranger to LA.

The Los Angeles Riots of 1992, a massive part of LA history, were sparked by the acquittal of police officers in connection with the assault of Rodney King. These protests denounced police brutality and anti-Black racism, much like their 2020 counterparts. In 1994, tens of thousands of protestors gathered to decry Proposition 187, which aimed to deny undocumented immigrants use of public services in California.

The fashion, culture and even political movements we participate in echo the history of those who came before us. Whether based on nostalgia, wounds that never closed or simply the 20 to 30-year cycle we have observed in trends since the 1950s, it's clear that the '90s are hella back.



#### House of Cards

Even through this tension, it represents the raw, human willingness to embrace the fragility of being in love.



#### Everybody Scream Florence and the Machine
