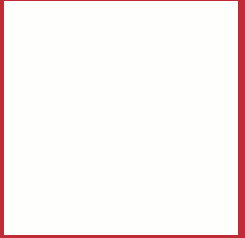

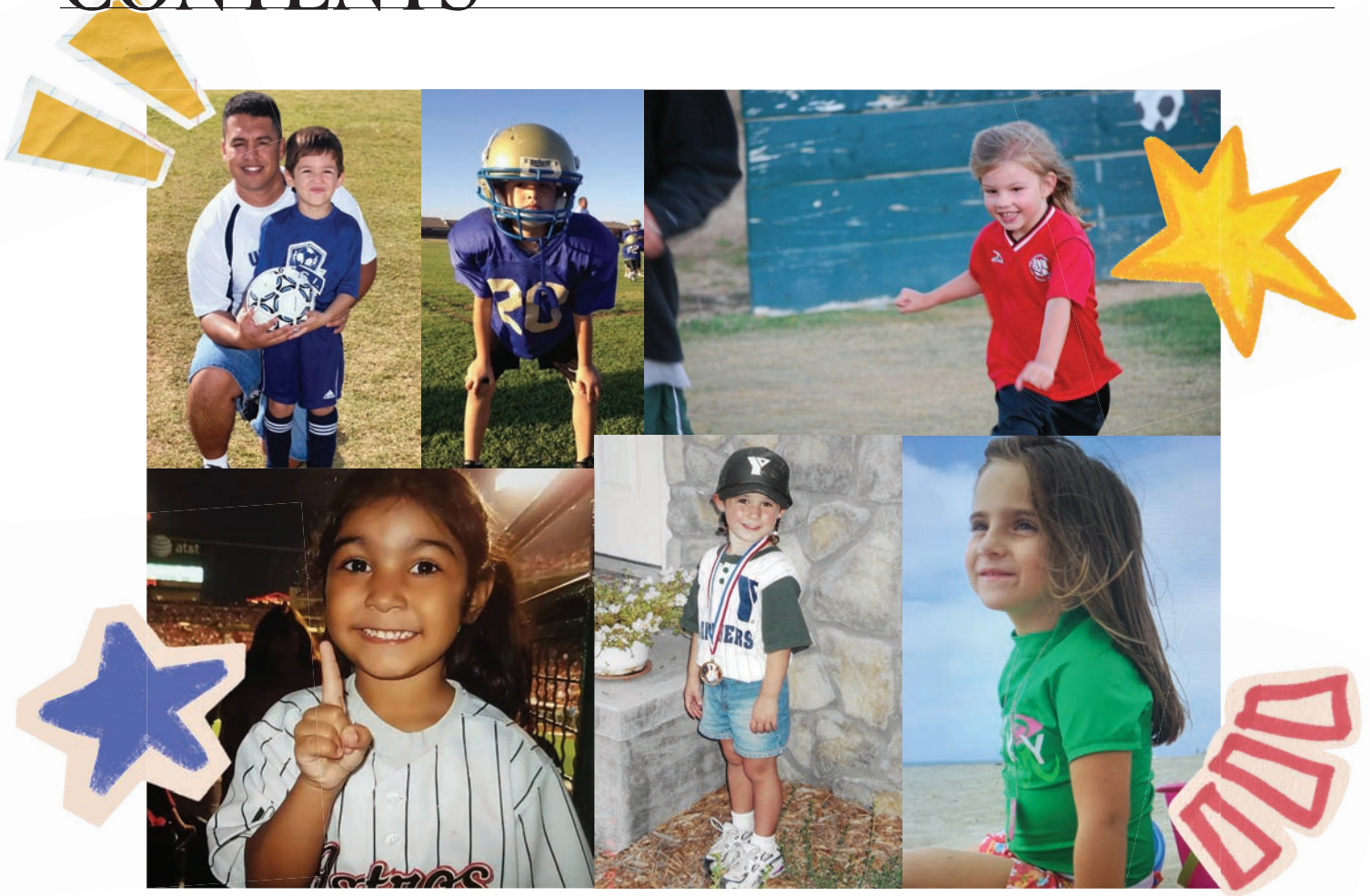

FIFA unveils new 48-team world cup draw

Being only a few days out, the Fédération Internationale de Football Association (FIFA) will introduce a newly expanded tournament that will feature 48 participating countries, leaving behind the tournament's previous 32-nation format competition introduced in France '98.

FIFA officials have recognized that the game of football has become a global phenomenon, and this is the first time in the history of the tournament that three nations will host, including Canada, Mexico and the U.S.

Mexico remains the only nation to have hosted the FIFA World Cup twice, in 1970 and again in 1986. The 2026 edition will mark a historic third time.

Estadio Azteca in Mexico City has staged the world's greatest football legends such as Pelé who's known as The King. He lifted the title in 1970 with Brazil displaying jogo bonito, which characterizes Brazilian soccer, and Diego Armando Maradona who took the "Albiceleste," Argentina's national team, to glory in 1986 on Aztec soil.

FIFA will determine the fate of the 48 participating countries by placing each nation into one of four seeded pots.

As for the host nations, they are automatically placed in Pot 1 alongside FIFA's highest-ranked teams.

Pot 1 will include football powerhouses like Spain, Argentina, France, England, Brazil, Portugal, Netherlands and Belgium.

Pot 2 will include Croatia, Morocco, Colombia, Switzerland, Japan, Senegal, Austria, Australia, Iran, South Korea, Ecuador and two-time world champion Uruguay.

Pot 3 will include Norway, Panama, Egypt, Algeria, Scotland, Paraguay, Tunisia, Ivory Coast, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, South Africa and first-time tournament participant Uzbekistan.

Pot 4 will include Jordan, Ghana, Haiti, New Zealand and debutant countries Curacao and Cape Verde, with six positions remaining to be settled in the playoff round of eliminations for the final seeds. All remaining matches will be held in March.

As for the U.S., the men's national team's opening match will be held at SoFi Stadium on June 12, 2026. SoFi stadium will host eight matches throughout the tournament, including a few group stage matches and three knockout games, one of which is set to be a quarterfinal.

One of the world's greatest sporting spectacles is only six months away. Fans can tune in on Fox and Telemundo this Friday as coverage of the FIFA World Cup draw takes place at 9 a.m. PST. The official draw will be held on Dec. 5, 2026, from the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C.

A woman in a man's world

My experience as a female sports journalist

In 2023, I wrote my first sports article for my community college newspaper. After seeing the female sideline reporters on TV, I realized I could turn my love for the game into a career. It was then when I realized I belonged working in sports.

Fast forward about two and a half years later, I've become the head sports editor for a Division 1 university. My hard work and dedication to the craft has taken me far, but imposter syndrome still lingers.

As a petite young girl, I knew what I was getting myself into when I walked into the world of sports journalism. I knew that I was entering a man's world.

According to ESPN, in 2021, 79.2% of the sports editors were white and 83.3% were men, while 77.1% of the reporters were white, with 85.6% being men.

Though it's been very rewarding, it's also been difficult at times to hold my head high in this position.

This isn't my first rodeo as an editor either, as I have previous experience being the co-sports editor at my community college. This position came with the reality of having to work twice as hard as others in the room and the feeling of needing to prove why I'm good at what I do.

Not only am I a woman, but I am a woman of color. I don't want to be seen and just thrown into a Spanish section – my ultimate goal is to be a beat reporter for Major League Baseball.

There have been numerous times here I've been dismissed or not given the time of day by my peers. Oftentimes I find myself having to put on a serious "bad cop" act just to get them to listen to me.

More often than not, I find myself surrounded by male coworkers who can either be the best supporters or insufferable to work with. At the end of the day, it gets lonely sometimes being one of the few, if not the only,

woman in the room.

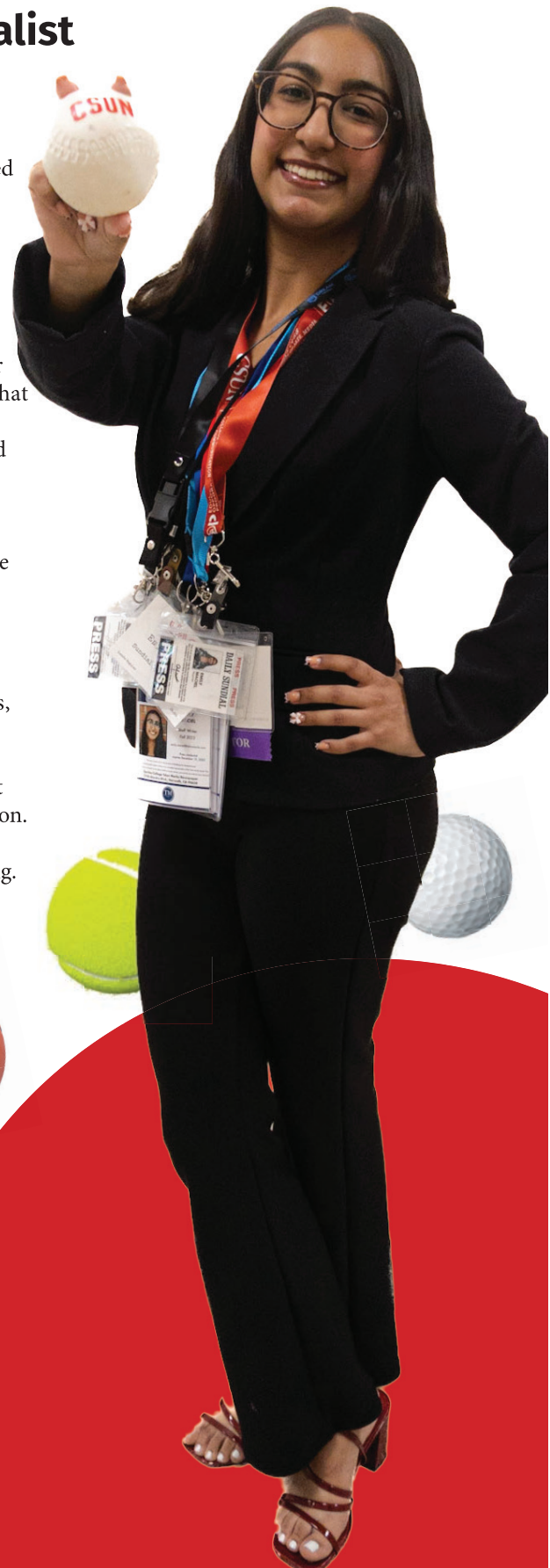
The Pew Research Center conducted a survey in 2022 on U.S. journalists and their beats. As if the numbers didn't explain it enough, the end result was that men are far more likely to cover sports than women.

However, the saddest part is knowing that a lot of men are either going to sexualize me or criticize what I have to say.

My knowledge is often questioned – I mean, would a man ask a fellow male to name five players when he says he's interested in sports?

On the other hand, the experience has been nothing short of fulfilling as I've been lucky to meet many people who do support me. I have been fortunate enough to interview countless athletes in multiple sports, all of which I've been able to tell a different story.

In these few years, I've learned a lot about myself as a writer and as a person. Even though this job can be hard, there's nothing else I'd rather be doing.

Jerseys, both modern and vintage, have become a popular clothing item that elevate most casual wear into sporty chic. hoodbaby, a small business based in LA, creates custom pieces out of real jerseys, adding lace and bows to them. The company even partnered with PUMA on a collection to highlight LA fútbol culture.

Being a staple in blokecore or its coquette counterpart, blokette, it won't be a surprise to see jerseys customized with bows or paired with lacey outfits.

AJ Lico finds that the resurgence of the jersey trend is reminiscent of vintage streetwear.

"I've seen people wear both official sports jerseys and fan attire, but I think the infamous blokette style and aesthetic is very common nowadays, not just in sporting events, but also in casual streetwear," Lico said. "I think this kind of style brought jerseys back into mainstream media, since the initial wave of jerseys in the 90s streetwear era."

Customization, in general, is becoming a trend for FIFA lovers. Gahumi is a company that designs customized scarves for soccer fans. According to the New York Times, scarves have been a common accessory for fans since the 1930s, but became more popular during the 1970s.

Gahumi predicts certain trends for custom scarves this year, including the classic jacquard knit and

the ultra-soft knit they offer, which allows for the scarves to have a double-sided design. These scarves act as a sign of support for teams, but serve a functional purpose in cooler weather as well.

"As satirical as it may seem, I love fanfare and those kinds of bizarre looks when people are covered in their favorite teams' colors from head to toe," Lico said. "I think it is so beautiful to see people connect with one another and find community through their passions."

Apart from customization, every year, fans wait eagerly for the new home and away kits. One of the shining stars in this year's releases is the Mexico kit. This is a pleasant surprise to Mexico fans after a disappointing 2024 home jersey reaction.

"Not my favorite. Fine for a non-World Cup year, but hopefully green returns for 2026," a Reddit user wrote under a post asking

for collectors' opinions on the design.

Luckily for them, they brought the classic green jersey back for this World Cup, with a sun stone design very heavily inspired by the iconic 1998 kit, which was a fan favorite.

Despite the positive reaction from fans, it was the Adidas Germany 2026 World Cup kit that won the best soccer kit of 2025. Keeping the traditional white base, it features stripes with the colors of the flag – red, black and yellow – meeting at the middle of the chest in a triangle shape. A blast from the past, it is inspired by their 1990 kit, when West Germany won the World Cup.

It's clear this World Cup year will focus heavily on nostalgic trends, with fans adding a personal touch to their collections.



SoFi Stadium to host eight World Cup games

The 2026 Fédération Internationale de Football Association World Cup returns to Southern California and takes part in a historic North American staging where SoFi Stadium is set to be a premier venue. The tournament will be a first of its kind with three host cities as all matches will be played across Mexico, Canada and the United States.

The last time the U.S. hosted was 32 years ago, when the 1994 World Cup edition culminated in one of FIFA's most memorable finals. The game was played between Brazil and Italy in Pasadena at the iconic Rose Bowl. The result came down to a sudden-death penalty shootout when Brazil earned its fourth historic title after winning 3-2.

Now the stage is set as the global game once again descends in Los Angeles.

SoFi Stadium will be a hub where soccer, or fútbol as it's known across the world, will feature eight marquee matches on the world's biggest stage. The first US opening game will be hosted at SoFi against Paraguay on Friday, June 12 at 6 p.m.

"Aside from the final per se, the opener of the home country hosting is probably one of the most coveted events in the world," Tony Vroman, senior director of facility campus operations strategy at SoFi Stadium, said.

Stan Kroenke, the owner of SoFi Stadium as well as the NFL Rams, has invested over five billion for the venue, and the Los Angeles Times asserts that it "looks as if it arrived from another world."

Currently SoFi consists of an artificial turf field which can be perfect for NFL requirements, but not quite for the standards of world-class soccer.

FIFA requires rigorous specifications which need to be met, and renovations need to be set in place. Last spring

SoFi debuted a new grass field technology ahead of the Confederation of North Central America and Caribbean Association Football Nations League.

"The sod surface is transported in large refrigerated trucks from the Pacific Northwest from the state of Washington," Vroman said. "FIFA came out with their consultants and worked side by side through the process, everyone said it was better if not above the par of Qatar's playing surface so we are very happy with the end result."

It's a pitch that consists of a unique and complex system. From a hybrid component of natural grass with the addition of artificial components that would be laid out over a retractable permavoid system.

In addition, an upgraded irrigation and ventilation system will allow for nature to take the course of imitating the natural components that will keep the natural pitch in perfect condition. The grass at SoFi will remain growing under roof structure which will have LED lighting acting as natural sunlight, allowing the process of photosynthesis to take the course of nature.

SoFi stands out from other stadiums because it's the largest, stretching over 3.1 million feet. Another addition is the jumbo video board, also known as the infinity screen, extends 70 thousand square feet and hangs over the midfield.

Along with the technicalities of the stadium for the matches itself, fans can look forward to new activities surrounding specialty food and beverage items and fan experiences.

"Several of our parking lots will become fan experience areas where there's brand activations, there's hospitality, there's live entertainment stages," Vroman said.

Fans can catch all the action live on Fox Sports and Telemundo beginning Thursday, June 11, when the opening kickoff takes place.

FIFA's rising 2026 World Cup ticket prices concerns about fan affordability

Ticket prices for the 2026 FIFA World Cup have already soared for games in the U.S., with millions of international fans expected to travel for the tournament. How much fans pay to attend the first World Cup, which will be hosted by the U.S., Canada and Mexico, could determine who can watch games in person.

A quick glance at resale listings shows these steep prices. According to GameTime, tickets for U.S. vs. Paraguay at SoFi Stadium range from \$1,300 to upwards of \$3,000, depending on the section. However, listings on TickPick for matches like Iran vs. New Zealand begin at around \$400, indicating that ticket prices vary significantly by match and demand. Overall, strong demand continues to keep prices elevated as the tournament approaches.

Year-on-year comparisons tell a similar story of growth. People & Qatar note that current ticket sales are trending towards higher prices than Qatar 2022 FIFA World Cup, adjusted for inflation. Global interest, expanding scale of the tournament and overheads associated with hosting games in different countries have driven up prices. This year's host stadiums have larger capacities, so hosting and operational costs may contribute to price increases.

Ticket prices are also prompting concerns around affordability as the tournament nears. ESPN characterized some pricing decisions for the World Cup as "absurd," with some group-stage tickets priced as high as \$700. This was prior to FIFA adding a limited option for lower-priced tickets after backlash from fans.

NBC News reported many fans are already priced out of attending the

tournament, with some fans deeming ticket prices "absolutely insane" and concerned about rising costs stopping everyday fans from attending the World Cup.

Ticket prices are not the only thing one needs to budget for when looking to attend the 2026 FIFA World Cup. The resale listing for parking passes for SoFi Stadium matches on StubHub show that parking will tack on an additional cost for those driving to the game, with general parking currently listed at \$149.

Additional information about official World Cup Parking and event logistics is available through FIFA's Event partner, JustPark. Uber pricing from LAX to SoFi Stadium can give attendees an idea of how rides will factor into the total cost of attending a World Cup match, though costs vary depending on time and the day.

Official tickets have also already sold out. On the FIFA official ticket website, it is noted that the application period for supporter tickets has ended, leaving ticket resale sites as some of the few avenues remaining for fans to try to experience the game.

With the biggest World Cup in history featuring an expanded 48-team format quickly approaching, prices are rising for fans hoping to attend. Everything from secondary market jumps, travel costs, hotel accommodations and ticket availability are all a contributing factor.

Will both tiers of fans, average fans and high rollers, be able to attend? This question, as well as concerns over the overall cost, has been raised before. As the game's most popular spectacle continues to evolve into a money-making machine, the costs will likely keep rising.



additional visitors, the city aims to use water taxis, air taxis and electric school buses as alternative modes of transportation.

The budget for the 2028 Olympic Games is a massive \$7.15 billion, which aims to be privately funded without relying on taxpayer dollars. The 2028 Games follow in the footsteps of its 1984 predecessor, as the 1984 Los Angeles Summer Olympics were the first Olympic Games to be privately funded. This ultimately resulted in Los Angeles hosting the first Games to ever turn a significant profit.

Critics fear that the 2028 Games will follow in the footsteps of the 1984 Games in more sinister ways as well, per a Washington Post analysis by assistant professor of history and African American studies at Ball State University, Max Felker-Kantor.

“Garcetti and others heap praise on the ’84 Games for its profitability and investment in sports,” Felker-Kantor wrote. “But they ignore the dark side of the Games. ... Partnering with the Department of Defense, the LAPD hired additional officers, at a cost of more than \$20 million, to ‘sanitize the area’ and keep crime to a

minimum during the Games.”

Incumbent mayor of Los Angeles, Karen Bass, vowed that unhoused Angelenos would not be bused out of the city as many were ahead of the 2024 Paris and 2016 Rio De Janeiro Games, according to the Associated Press.

“However our strategy evolves, it will always be housing people first,” Bass said in an interview with the Los Angeles Times. “It will never be putting people on a bus and shipping them out.”

The next three years will be as much about gold medals and goal posts as they will be about balancing a global spotlight while showing up for the community that stays long after closing ceremonies end. With billions of dollars invested and major refurbishment projects across Los Angeles, the impact of three years of back-to-back hosting remains to be seen.

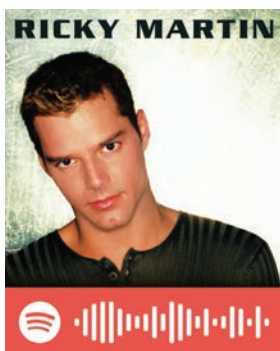
"Wavin' Flag"

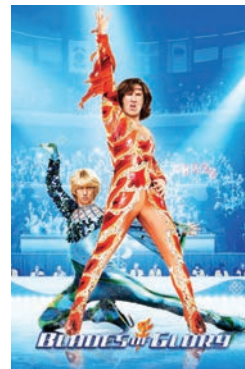
Field of Dreams (1989)

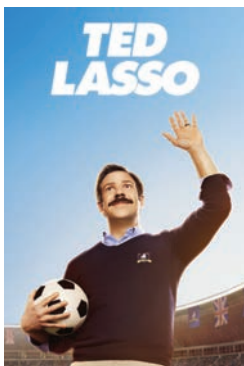
Bend It Like Beckham (2002)

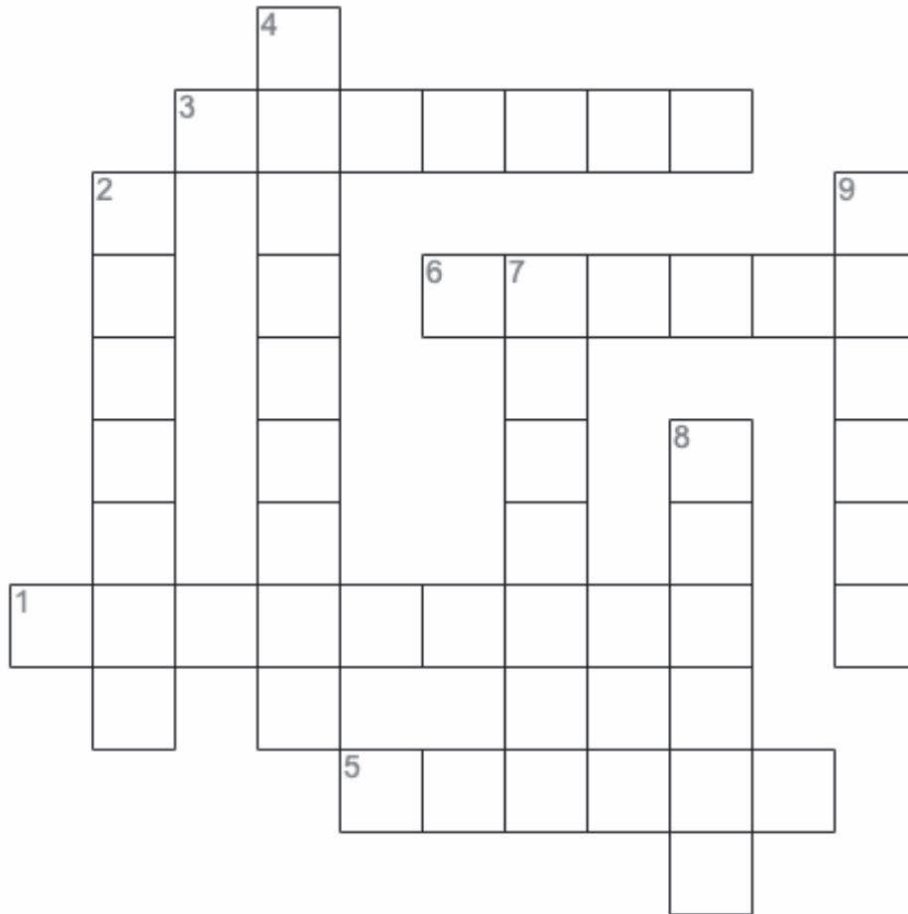


She's the Man (2006)

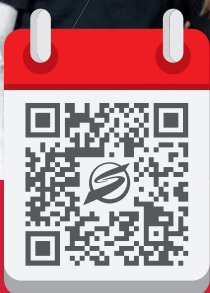
